War Date "Milton Bradley" Advertising Letter

Don Kolkman noticed this interesting item on the eBay online auction site and thought members would enjoy seeing it. The description was given as follows: "In 1861, Milton Bradley (later to be famous for developing toys and games) was solicitor of patents. This is an advertising circular with a magnificent patriotic motif. It displays the Union flag and bears the motto, "UNION and LIBERTY". The last bid we noticed on it was \$100.00.

Solicitor of Patents
184 Main St. Springfield Mass - 1861

Dear Sir

I would respectfully call your attention to my facilities for transacting business with the Patent Office - Having been constantly engaged in mechanical pursuits, as a draughtsman for the last ten years - it will be seen that I possess great advantages in clearly illustrating an invention, by means of drawings and descriptions [as required by law] not possessed by those who are obliged to employ others to make their drawings, and even then have a limited acquaintance with mechanics, and mechanical terms, -

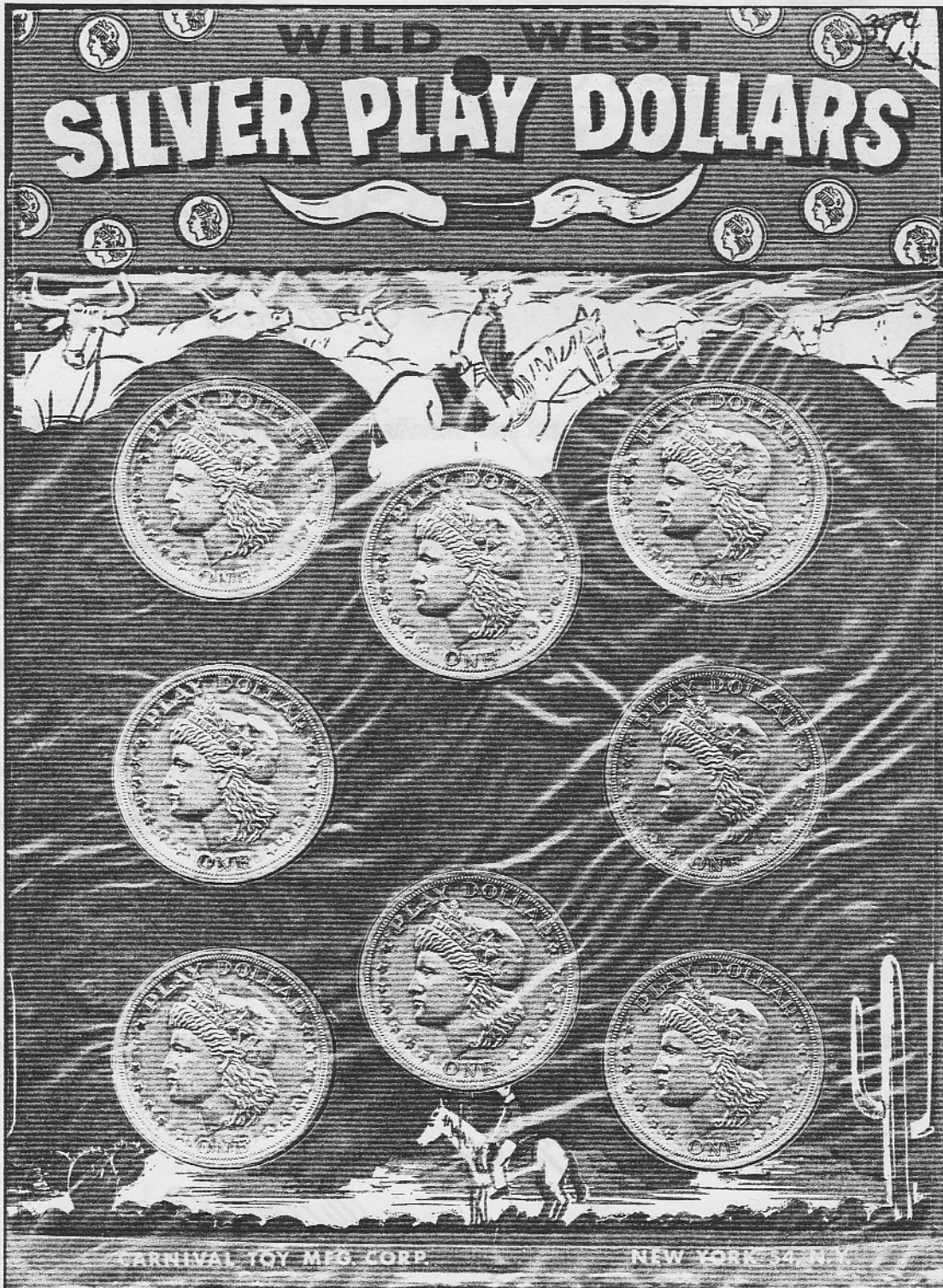
In every case which I undertake no part is trusted to another person, and all communications are strictly confidential. - Opinions in regard to the patentability of inventions given gratis - Preliminary examinations made at Washington when desired. All charges moderate and in proportion to the labor involved in each case. Also Mechanical Drawings of all kinds executed with neatness and accuracy. References given to mechanics and Inventors in this vicinity on application as above.

WILD WEST Silver Play Dollars

This neat card of Play Dollars was a recent find on the eBay online auction. They are listed in Richard Clothier's book as P251. The card, which measures 7 1/4 inches wide by 10 inches tall, is printed in red, white, and blue with both sides being identical. It appears that the original price was 39¢ (it is still written in the upper right hand corner). As Richard notes, the coins are very attractive plastic with a heavy silver plating. The obverse shows Liberty while the reverse displays the American eagle quite similar to a U.S. Morgan silver dollar. Along the bottom of the card is printed "Carnival Toy Mfg. Corp. New York 54, N.Y." They are a wonderful addition to the author's collection!

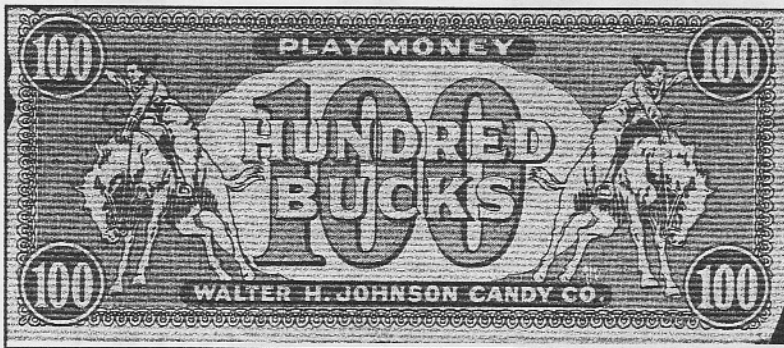
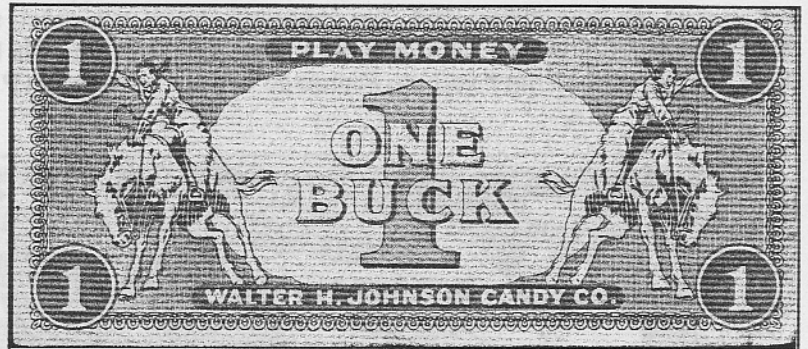

These two neat bills were recently acquired in a trade and nothing is known about their age, origin, or use. In Memoriam

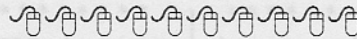
We mourn the loss of a fellow member, David Rogers, #55.
