
I remember watching Howdy Doody in 1948 on that wonderful new invention television. It was Howdy Doody time then, and even now, if someone asks me the time, I want to give that same answer from over 50 years ago. What a special thing it was for a little kid to watch his new friends Howdy Doody, Buffalo Bob, Dilly Dally, Clarabelle, and the other characters on the show.

The show started in 1947 and ran until 1960 on NBC. How many of us remember that while Clarabelle did not speak, at the end, he said "goodbye kids"?

In his 1996 book, Hake's Price Guide to Character Toy Premiums, Ted Hake does not list play money, but there is Howdy Doody Play Money. Printed in the United States and copyrighted by Spec T Adv. Serv. Inc. of New York, the money was put out by the Canadian firm The Ogilvie Flour Mills Co., Limited. A piece of Howdy Doody Play Money could be found in every package of Ogilvie Oats, Vita-13, Cake Mix and Ogilvie Flour. When a million dollars of Howdy Doody Play Money was accumulated, it could be used to buy a "beautiful BSA Bicycle". The deadline for the offer was June 1, 1954.


Each note is 2 1/2 by 5 3/8 inches. Denominations were from 10 dollars to one hundred thousand dollars. To date, we have been able to collect denominations of 10, 20, 100, 500, 1,000, 5,000, 10,000 and 25,000 dollars. We know it will be even more challenging to get the other denominations, particularly since there had to be many less issued for higher denominations.































This reverse is common to all pieces except for the denomination in the upper corners. The printing is all dark green and the offer expires June 1st 1954.

And, if anyone asks you the time, tell them "Its Howdy Doody time", and always will be!

Editors Note: Reading the Howdy Doody article led me to look at the pieces I have in my collection and look for any differences. I have two types of the 100 note with Oscar on the front and both have the very same obverse. One is exactly like the one in the above article, but the other has a different reverse. It is from the Burry's Bakers which produced Howdy Doody Cookies.



Since this is the only one of the Burry's notes that I have seen, I assume that they are even harder to find than the Ogilvie notes, which I find very difficult to acquire at what I consider a reasonable price. Those Howdy Doody collectors seem willing to pay pretty well to acquire anything with his likeness. So, just when you thought you were making great progress, along comes a note like this one, which proves that there are even more hiding somewhere out there.



colored cardboard with
black printing and is
printed on only one
side.

There are also bills by this maker and one is shown below at reduced size. They measure 7 inches by 3 inches and come in 6 denominations: \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20 and \$100. They are printed in dark green on a light green paper with both sides being the same. The bills read "Educational Toy Money J.S. Latta, Cedar Falls, Iowa." This at least gives us a location, but not much else is known.

Does anyone have more information on the origin or use of this great money? Thanks for sharing this with us Danny.



PIRATE'S GOLD DOUBLOONS

The gold doubloons pictured below were found at the Museum of Science and Industry (MOSI) in Tampa, Florida in August, 1998. The MOSI Science Store had seven different gold anodized aluminum doubloons for sale. All seven were made with a common reverse showing the date, 1587, below a crest with an eagle at the top and GOLD DOUBLOON on both sides.







The first two pictures show THE HISPANOLA and THE CREW.


Pictures were made at 129% of actual size (39mm).

Interplanetary Credits

Don Kolkman provided the following information on some interesting notes that he recently acquired. As shown approximately actual size, they are titled the United Federation Of Planets and come in six denominations of Interplanetary Credits: one-tenth, one-half, one. two, five, and ten. The front is printed in light red while the reverse has blue print. They came in a single large sheet which appears to be a printer's proof page containing all the six denominations. It is signed by the designer, so it may be one of a kind.

Don was also able to obtain additional information from the seller with a few interesting tidbits about the note's creation and origin. Excerpts from a 1975 memo include:





The Interplanetary Credits-

The Product is copyrighted in the name of Franz Joseph Designs.

World-wide marketing rights not determined. Convention dealers indicate a high sci-fi fan demand for the product.

Marketing: a search is underway for a suitable product producer. Pricing and other factors have not been determined.

Estimated domestic sales: in excess of 20 million copies.

Other: I am currently holding the Master Plates for 5 color reproductions.

(Seller) "Since he was planning to go with five colors, I would guess you are now the owner of a rare printer's page proof autographed by the designer."

The seller also provided an additional letter from the designer, Franz Joseph, which is dated September 18, 1975. The return address is:

Star Fleet Command

Star Fleet Headquarters

United Federation of Planets

Franz Joseph

United Federation Representative

In the letter Mr Joseph talks about his recent creations of Star Fleet items and plans. In his words "I designed and copyrighted 6 denominations of Interplanetary Credits (future fiat space currency) which were introduced at the Red Hour Festival in San Francisco in February 1975". And later in the letter, "A market already exists for the Interplanetary Credits".

But, it appears that this money may never have been produced even though it was introduced at an event. Really a nice space collectible. Nice work, Don, and thanks for sharing it with us!

Interplanetary Play Money

Taking a cue from the previous story, Interplanetary Credits, we will look at some more Interplanetary notes. There are so many different types that we could probably devote an entire issue to nothing but space related money, but for now we will go with these.

As shown in the pictures, this is another set of currency type play money. The notes are quite colorful and measure about 5 1/2 inches by 2 1/4 inches. Your author has the notes in four colors (green,red, blue, and tan) from eight planets or locations: Jupiter, Neptune, Venus, Luna, Mercury, Mars, Terra, and Saturn. For the purpose of this article and to list in my collection, I have referred to the front of the note as the one where the planet name or location appears and left the common design to be the reverse.


The front of each note has the denomination number in each corner with the location name at the top. A rocket ship appears in the center with the denomination written out below it. Printed along the left side is "GUARANTEED BY INTERPLANETARY BANK", "Cosmi Unicap TREAS.", a seal with "IB" in the center, and "THIS ISSUE

SECURED BY DEPOSIT IN VAULT OF HEAVEN". Along the right side is printed "REDEEMABLE AT ALL INTERPLANETARY BANKS IN 80.1° REFINED STARDUST", "ISSUED BY (here each note refers to a bank with it's own name, such as "NATIONAL BANK OF NEPTUNE"), and "ONE COSMA BY WGT. = ONE UNIVAR".

The reverse is common to all the notes and shows a rocket ship on each side with the denomination in number by it. "UNIVARS INTERPLANETARY PLAY MONEY" is in the top center with a picture of a space man or astronaut below it. Next is "COPYRIGHT BY THE TRACIES CO., HOLYOKE,




The Common Reverse.

MASS." The denomination is written out at the bottom.



Interplanetary Play Money, continued

APMS Member Richard Clothier in his book, *Play Money of American Children*, has this to say about this series. "To try to regain a larger share of the play money market Tracies introduced SPACE MONEY bills in the late 1960's which featured designs of rockets, astronauts, and planets in 12 denominations of UNIVARS. The package contained thirty bills. Unfortunately, the attempt was a failure. By then, foreign competition was too entrenched and American children were so wealthy through inflation that play money seemed unnecessary."



Parker Brothers Toy Money

This set came in a dark maroon box that measures about 7 1/2 inches by 6 1/2 inches. The top is printed in gold and says: "Toy Money with "Make Believe" Bills, Parker Brothers Inc., Salem, Mass., New York, London."



The box contained both bills and coins in the following denominations:

Bills (6), \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100

Coins (9), 1¢, 5¢, 10¢, 25¢, 50¢, \$1, \$5, \$10, \$20

The bills are green print on an off white background and measure about 7 3/8 inches by 3 1/8 inches. The box only had one or two of each denomination and it appeared that this may have been the original number due to the small storage space provided.

The coins are black print on orange cardboard for the \$5, \$10 & \$20, and black print on gray cardboard for the others. These coins are different than the ones listed as P1 through P9 in Richard Clothier's book, *Play Money of American Children.* The amount of each coin denomination in the box ranged from 3 to 16, which may or may not have been the original number in the set. The box may be a bit rough, but it sure was a nice addition to my collection.


