Cracker Jack

Save any ten different President Coins, no two alike, mail direct to us and we will return the coins to you with a membership in the Cracker Jack Mystery Club. Join the Cracker Jack Mystery Club just as soon as you have any ten different President Coins. It is lots of fun, besides, you have the collection of these beautiful silverine coins. Use other side of this card.

READ EVERYTHING CAREFULLY.

Be sure to wrap your ten different coins in heavy paper or cardboard before putting in envelope for mailing. Or mail them in a little box.

Recently while looking for Cracker Jack president tokens on ebay I ran across a lot described as "CRACKER JACK COIN & CARD". I did not know what this meant so I clicked on it to check it out. There was a very nice example of a George Washington "coin" reverse token and, to my astonishment, the above card! I had never seen anything like this before. Since I specialize in this series I knew that I just had to have it. Fortunately I was able to obtain it at a very reasonable price.

This card depicts a George Washington coin and states the following:

"CRACKER JACK OR CHECKERS (this line is half cut off on the above card) All presidents of U.S.A. from George Washington to Franklin D. Roosevelt – the complete assortment of 31 will be found in Cracker Jack or Checkers packages. Save any ten different President Coins, no two alike, mail direct to us and we will return the coins to you with a membership in the Cracker Jack Mystery Club. Join the Cracker Jack Mystery Club just as soon as you have any ten different President Coins. It is lots of fun; besides, you have the collection of these beautiful silverine coins. Use other side of this card."

To the side it reads: "Be sure to wrap your ten different coins in heavy paper or cardboard before putting in envelope for mailing. Or mail them in a little box."



On the other side of the card it gives the address of the Cracker Jack Mystery Club and a place for the boy or girl to fill out their name and address. To the left is a short survey. It asks the boy or girl if they prefer candy and toys best or if they prefer coins and toys best.

I am trying to figure out where this card was in the box of Cracker Jacks or Checkers. This card measures 4 1/2" x 2". The way it is creased it looks like it was attached to the top of the box as the top flap. It is not creased in a way that it would have been folded around the coin inside the box. Boy, would I love to find an original box with this President coin advertising on it.

CRACKER JACK UPDATE (continued)

Besides my earlier article in this newsletter there was one other source of information on this series. It is Tom Casper's article that appeared in the June 1979 issue of the TAMS journal. Tom states in his article that "when a child had three different president medals, he (or she) was eligible to join the Cracker Jack Mystery Club. He would send in his three different president medals and would receive 10 new different presidential medals stamped "Cancelled" on the reverse, a display case and a Cracker Jack Mystery Club Certificate."

The above box top seems to disagree with Casper's information. It states that the child must have 10 different president coins before sending them in. It does not say that the 10 coins the child would get back would be cancelled but I am assuming they would be. However, nowhere on the card does it say that the child would receive a display case for his or her Cracker Jack coins.

To find out more I contacted Tom and asked him where he got the information for his TAMS article. He said that he got information from many different sources. Tom said that he was "told" by someone that the display cases were black with a blue velvet lining and snapped shut and that they were unmarked. I would think that Cracker Jack Co. would want it's name splashed prominently on such a display case. Until someone comes up with one I think that the case can only be considered hearsay. He also supplied me with the following very interesting letter.

CRACKER JACK MYSTERY CLUB

Dear Member:

The enclosed Cracker Jack mystery surprise together with ten different brand new coins are sent to you as a special courtesy for joining the Cracker Jack Mystery Club.

 $\ensuremath{\text{I}}$ hope that you and your friends will have lots of fun with this little novelty.

To join again you will only need 3 different coins and you are entitled to join the Cracker Jack Mystery Club as often as you send in 3 different President Silverine Coins and receive other surprises. Remember that the coins I return to you are cancelled and that you cannot use them again. You must collect three new ones in order to become a member more than once.



P.S. - The coins you sent us were somewhat tarnished so I thought you would enjoy getting ten different brand new ones.

The letter appears to be one that the Cracker Jack Co. would send to the child along with 10 "Cancelled" coins after the child signed up and sent in 10 different president coins. It states that after joining the child would only have to save up 3 more different president coins before sending them in for 3 more "Cancelled" ones and another Mystery surprise. The child could continue sending in the coins, once a member, after saving 3 different coins and getting in return "Cancelled" coins and new surprises.

This is where Tom got his information of sending in 3 coins for prizes. Actually when you put his letter together with my "card" at the top of this article you begin to get a clearer picture. First you must send in 10 different coins and once a member you only need to save up 3 different ones before redeeming them with Cracker Jack Co.

CRACKER JACK UPDATE (continued)



Tom also sent me a copy of the above note. He only had a copy, not the original. The obverse of the note reads as follows:

member of the

Cracker Jack Mystery Club.

"You are entitled to join the Cracker Jack Mystery Club as many times as you send in any three different (no two alike) Silverine President Coins found in Mystery Cracker Jack or Mystery Checkers [Jack the Sailor Boy figure] packages if the coins have not been previously sent to us and do not show our cancellation mark. All Silverine President Coins will be returned to the sender. Cracker Jack Mystery Club 4800 W. 66th St. Chicago, Ill."

The reverse reads as follows:

"This is to certify that the bearer whose name appears below, has collected three different Silverine President Coins found in Mystery Cracker Jack or Mystery Checkers packages, and is now a member of the Cracker Jack Mystery Club, entitled to receive this membership certificate and the courtesies of Jack the Sailor Boy, Grand Magician."

This note measures 6 1/4" wide by 2 7/8" high and appears to be the membership certificate and could have been one of the "mystery surprises". Does anyone out there have one of these notes? I have never seen one.

If someone does have a membership certificate or a display case for these Cracker Jack coins please let me know or share it with FUN MONEY. I am skeptical as to the existence of a display case. If they were given with each membership a few would have been found by collectors with at least 10 "Cancelled" coins on them by now I would think. On the other hand you would think that more of the membership certificates would have surfaced as well. Who knows??

Editor's note: After receiving this article from Randy, I contacted him and told him that while I too had never seen the Mystery Club bill there is a great picture of one in the book "Cracker Jack Prizes" by Alex Jaramillo. It is shown in full color on page 42 for those of you who have the book. They say the currency was "widely distributed" so what happened to all of these great notes?

British Isles Toy Coins

Your editor recently acquired a nicely done book on some of the play money coins used in the United Kingdom. It is written by American Play Money Society member David Evans. This soft cover, 70 page book covers plastic toy coins and their related paper money. There are eight pages of illustrations to help in identification and I immediately found several coins that had been in my "unknown" file. Additionally, there are three "Coin Finder" pages that also help to find the correct attribution. This is followed by sections on each of the makers. Here you will find a background description and the listing of the known coins with their numbers and a rarity rating. Suggested values are also given. When possible the coin numbers are also crossreferenced to the older book by David Rogers, "Toy Coins".


This is a great reference book for anyone who doesn't limit their interests to only those issues in the United States. Also, the author is working on his next book which will catalogue GB card coins.

INTERPLANETARY CURRENCY

Another recent sighting on, where else, eBay auction was this booklet of Interplanetary Currency. The bills are not too difficult to find, but this is the first time your editor has seen the booklet that they came in. The pictures below show the front and back of the booklet plus one of the bills. Since the bills measure about 5 1/2 inches wide by 2 1/4 inches high, then the booklet itself must be just slightly larger. Examination of all the bills in my collection showed that all except one had the staple holes from the booklet. The lone exception bill without holes is also slightly larger at 5 7/8 inches by 2 7/16 inches. So, perhaps they did distribute some notes another way.

"Great Board Games" Book


This is a large, attractive, hard cover book that measures about 10 1/2 inches by 15 inches. It has 80 pages plus 5 pages of inserts and was published in 1979. Compiled by Brian Love, the book contains over 40 games from the period of 1895-1955 that you can play. The pages provide the game boards and instructions, so the playing fields are a bit smaller than in the original games. And, consequently, the playing pieces and play money are also much smaller. The insert sheets are to be cut up to provide the game pieces and play money.


There are three different types of play money bills and each bill measures about 1 1/4 inches wide by 5/8 inch tall.

- 1. Hopalong Cassidy in five denominations (250, 500, 1000, 2000 & 5000). This is used in the "Hopalong Cassidy Game" which was published by the Milton Bradley Company in 1950.
- 2. Eddie Cantor in four denominations (5, 10, 20 & 100). This is used in "Eddie Cantor's New Game, Tell It To The Judge", which was produced by Parker Brothers in 1939.
- 3. Generic type money in five denominations (25¢, 50¢, \$1.00, \$2.50, & \$5.00). This is used in "The Game of Playing Department Store" produced by Parker Brothers in 1898.

There are several other games in the book that sounded like they should use play money, however, the instructions showed that all of them used counters or cards instead of play money. This is not uncommon in early games since the concept of money was not always held in high esteem.

It was only by chance that I ran across this book in an antique mall and consider it a stroke of luck that I happened to notice the play money connection. Once again, it shows that you never know when that play money may appear.





The generic type money is shown above the Eddie Cantor bills, while the five denominations of Hoppy money are shown at the right.

All are about actual size.










Space Patrol Item on eBay
