

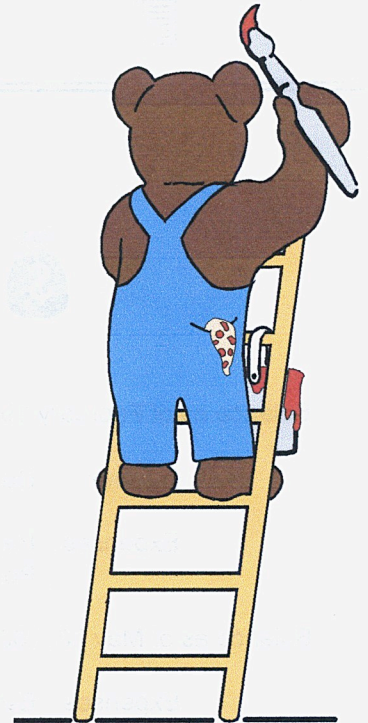
Final Issue!

Editor's Notes

Yes, you read correctly. This is the last issue of *Fun Money*. The American Play Money Society has discontinued operations as of May 31, 2002. While the number of APMS members has remained fairly stable, the interest in exchanging information via newsletters has declined significantly. Many newsletters and magazines are suffering from the same malady. The internet is probably the greatest influence on these declines since many of us now obtain the information we want virtually immediately. So when a newsletter comes out two or three months later, much of the information is old news. Yes, it is true that it can fill another need by providing good, in-depth articles on narrowly defined subjects; however, even that can be obtained by a search of the internet and a few emails to knowledgeable sources. The number of articles contributed decreased last year and we finally arrived at the point where no articles were submitted for this issue with only a few comments from members.

But, it has been a great run and a lot of fun for your editor. As many of you know, we formed the organization in March 1996 and published the first issue of *Fun Money* in June of that year. Thirty folks signed on as charter members and we were off and running. And we had many great articles through the years as you

NEW COINS OF THE WORLD

Recently I purchased a group of 11 different plastic coins. The on-line auction picture was not too good, but the description sounded like ones I needed so I went for them. When they came I was happy to see that they were all New Coins of The World, even if they were all the same gold color.

In his book, *Play Money of American Children*, Richard Clothier had no additional information on the series, but he does list 16 known coins from different countries. Prior to getting this latest batch I only had found 18 coins, but some of them were different than the listed coins. So as I usually do when confronted with a situation like this, I made a table to show all the known countries and colors. The table was put up on my play money web page at <http://japhillips.home.mindspring.com/pmjack/> and it was not long before I heard from member Bob Nolan that he had 4 more coins to add to the list.

As mentioned in Clothier's book, each coin is one inch in diameter and made of colored plastic. They all show a common reverse as shown in the pictures. Each picture is shown about 150% of their actual size to help show the details of these neat coins. And after that is the table with all the coins known to me at the time of publication. I expect more members to let me know what they have and I will update the on-line table as I receive input. It appears that these coins are not too easily found and Clothier's R-3 rarity rating may be about right. Let us hear from you.



The 3 coins shown here are representative of all the coins. These are shown about one and one-half times their actual size of one inch in diameter.

The common reverse is shown on the right and says "New Coins Of The World".

The top coin is Arabia in the color Salmon. It says "Kaaba-Mecca Arabia".

The middle coin is Iceland in Light Blue. It says "Nat'l Theater Iceland".

The bottom coin is Turkey in Gold. It says "Mosque Turkey".

Pack o' Coins

Recently I obtained two unopened packets of play money coins that appear to be previously unknown. The coins are nicely struck on a thick aluminum foil backed by plain thin beige cardboard. So the coins are thin and easily flexed or bendable.

The penny coin: "Japan One Penny Play Money: with head of boy (full-faced, a bit monkey-like; may be intended to be a monkey)", 19 mm.

Nickel similar with bust of elephant, 21 mm.

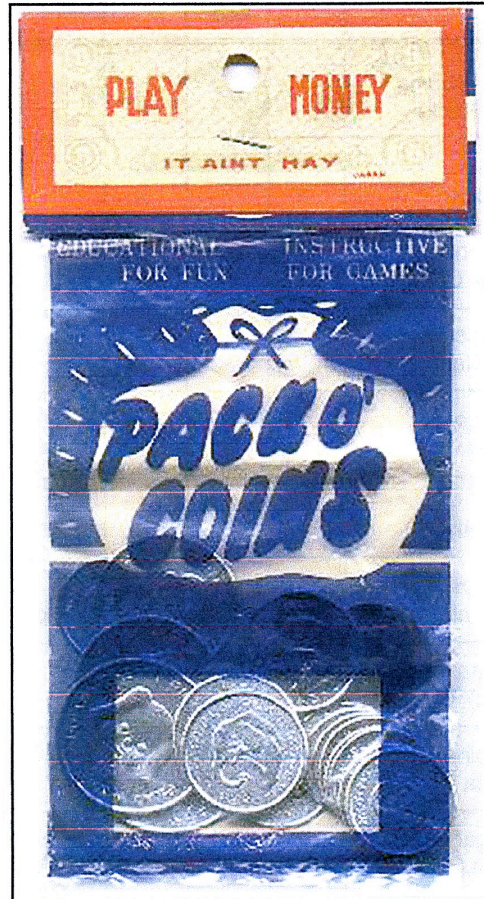
Dime has clown head with tall conical hat, large 24 mm.

Twenty Five Cents has dog head and is large 26 mm!

Fifty Cents has horse head left, 31 mm.

The label at top is stapled over a different label (cannot read it all without removing the staple) reading World Toy House, Inc., ©Saint Paul 2, Minnesota. This pre-zip code address indicates a 1963 or earlier year of manufacture.

These were in my mail auction that closed April 29, 2002.

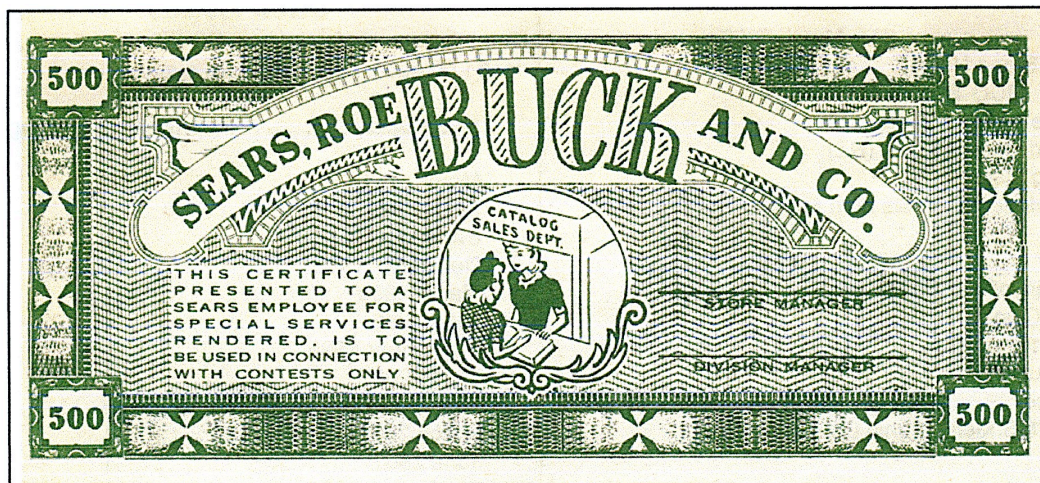
Sears Bucks

Hot Money

The recent mail bid auction by member Steve Alpert had several interesting play money related items, some of which your editor was able to obtain. Shown here is one of the paper money lots titled "Hot Money". It consisted of a stack of bills with a cardboard holder with the top shown below. Each of the enclosed bills also had the same obverse except for the different denomination. Each side of the holder says "Burn Up A Fortune In (HOT MONEY) Over 200 Bills" and "Japan" in one corner.

There are four denominations: \$20, \$100, \$10,000, and \$50,000. All reverses are also the same except for the denomination. A reverse is shown below approximately the actual size of 6 inches by 2 1/2 inches. The serial numbers on the front are HM11890 plus the denomination. Maybe these were made to help start a fireplace, but they will get a bit more respect here.



The top of the cardboard holder shown about actual size.
The front of the bills are like this minus the red stripe and its wording.



This shows the reverse of one bill.
All reverses are the same except for the denomination.

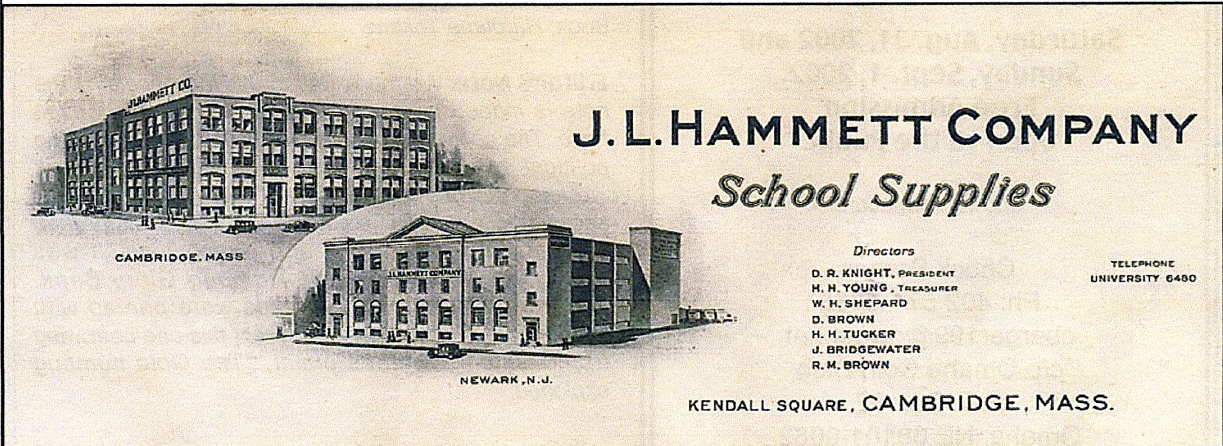

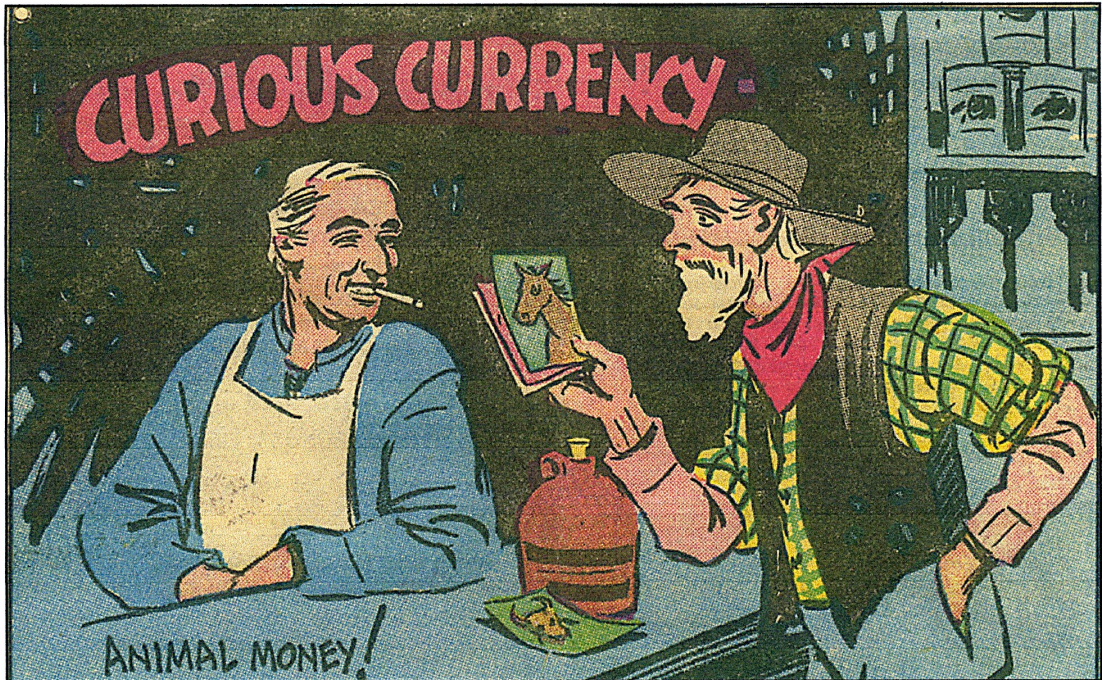

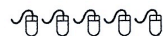


Animal Money! The John Hix Scrap Book was run in some of the Sunday comic pages in the 1930's. We have one dated July 3, 1938, that has been cut out and describes some "Curious Currency". Among the items mentioned was the following quote: "Animal Money! Currency with animal pictures on it, denoting various values, was used in early Arizona for those who could not read... A calf was worth 25¢; a rooster 50¢; a horse \$1; a bull \$5; and a lion \$10..." We have never seen one of these items so probably would not recognize it, but a set would sure be nice in the play money collection even if it was "real money" at one time.

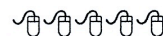

From Phil De Rosa: The note on page 14 of the March newsletter is a piece issued by the Whig Party around 1837. It is a satirical item ripping Andrew Jackson and his policies. You should be able to find it in the Rulau Book, *Hardtime Tokens*.

Editor's Note: We thank Phil for his identification. The note is indeed pictured on page 7 of the edition we have. The caption under the picture is as follows: Whig political satire note of 1837 for 6 cents depicts six Jackson "cents" and a number of other symbols associated with his presidency--donkey, hickory leaf, tall hat and spectacles, and peace pipe. It was supposedly issued by the Humbug Glory Bank. Hundreds of parody bank notes were printed with quotes from Benton and Van Buren, this one borrowing from Daniel Webster's plaint, "The Gold humbug exploded."
