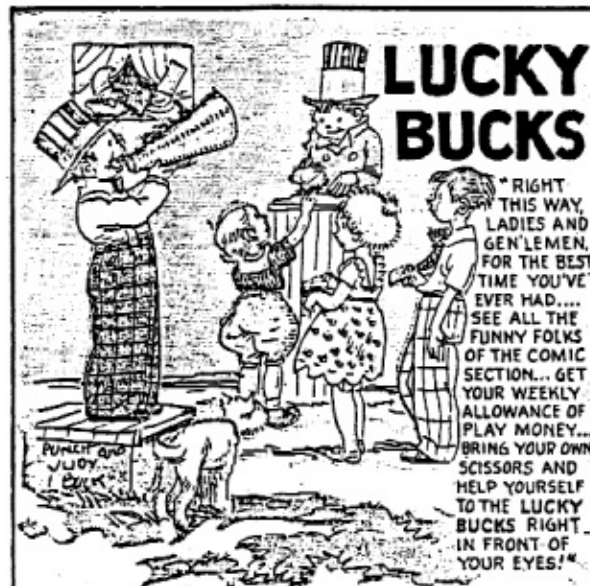

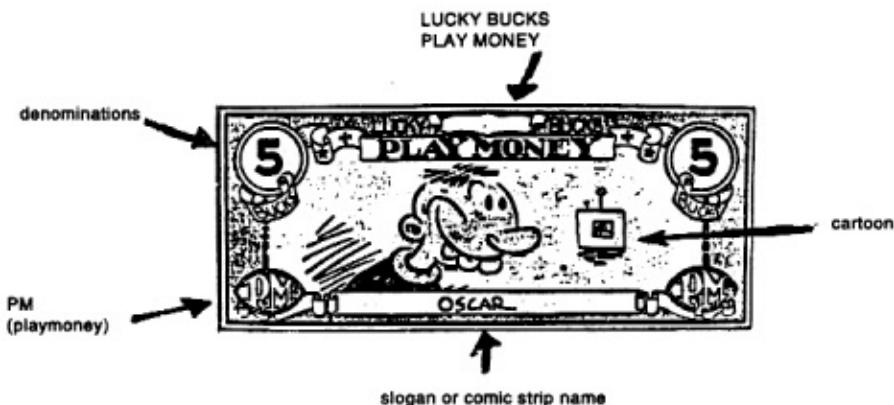

MY EARLIEST "LUCKY BUCKS" IS JULY 1932. I BELIEVE THEY STARTED IN THE SUMMER OF 32 AND CONTINUED THROUGH 1933. THERE ARE A FEW THAT APPEARED IN THE 1940'S, BUT NOT AS ELABORATE AS 32/33.



THE "LUCKY BUCKS" PLAY MONEY EACH HAD A DIFFERENT COMIC PICTURE IN THE MIDDLE, "LUCKY BUCKS" PLAY MONEY AT THE CENTER TOP, A SLOGAN OR COMIC STRIP NAME AT THE CENTER BOTTOM, DENOMINATION AT THE TOP 2 CORNERS AND PM (PLAY MONEY) AT THE BOTTOM 2 CORNERS.



THE DENOMINATIONS I HAVE SEEN ARE 1, 2, 3, 5, 10, 13, 20, 25, 50, 100, 500, 1000, 2000, 3000, AND 5000.

MOST PLAY MONIES WERE COLORED, DEPENDING ON THE LOCAL NEWSPAPER WHICH PUBLISHED IT.

POPULAR COMICS OF 1932-33 THAT FEATURED "LUCKY BUCKS" WERE BLONDIE, BRINGING UP FATHER, THIMBLE THEATRE (POPEYE), MICKEY MOUSE, TOONERVILLE FOLKS, POLLY AND HER PALS, TOOTS AND CASPER, TILLIE THE TOILER, KATZENJAMMER KIDS, DUMB DORA, MOON MULLINS, BARNEY GOOGLE, WINNIE WINKLE, TIM TYLER'S LUCK, LITTLE BROTHER, "JUST KIDS", DAVE'S DELICATESSEN, PETE'S PUP, MISTER JACK, LITTLE JIMMY, ELMER, BOOB MCNUTT, COUNT SCREWLOOSE, FELIX THE CAT, SKIPPY, MUTT AND JEFF, JANE ARDEN, LITTLE JOE, THE KID SISTER, AND OTHERS.

"LUCKY BUCKS" PLAY MONEY AVERAGE IN SIZE ABOUT 4 1/4" X 2", SOMETIMES 3" X 1 1/2". BOTTOM "LUCKY BUCKS" MEASURE 1" X 3 1/4". THESE BOTTOM STRIPS CONTAINED 3 BUCKS AND MEASURED 1 1/4" X 11 1/2". THEY WERE NOT AS FANCY AS THE LARGER ONES.



"LUCKY BUCKS" APPEARED IN THE COMIC SECTION AS SINGLES, DOUBLES AND TRIPLES. SPECIAL HALF-PAGE BLOCKS CONTAINED 12 BILLS (MEASURING 9" X 13 1/2"). SOMETIMES THE COMIC STRIP HEADLINER CARRIED A BILL. COMIC TRADING STAMPS, SLOGANS AND CARTOON CHARACTERS SOMETIMES WERE OFF TO THE SIDE OF THE BILLS. EVEN THE ACTUAL CARTOON STRIP PLAYED UP THE COLLECTING AND USING "LUCKY BUCKS" PLAY MONEY.



HERE'S THE FIRST OF THE "TOOTS AND CASPER LUCKY BUCKS" FOR THE KIDDIE'S! A FIVE-BUCK BILL! CUT THEM OUT EACH WEEK AND USE THEM AS "COMIC PLAY MONEY" IN GAMES LIKE PLAYING STORE, CIRCUS, ETC.

The Fiber Pieces

Red Goose Premium Money was made of fiber during the 1940's when metal was needed to build ships, airplanes and other military equipment during World War II. The fiber tokens apparently were made from the same dies used previously to make bronze and aluminum pieces. Since descriptions of these pieces were given in the first two installments in December and March issues of **FUN MONEY**, only the type(s) of obverse and reverse will be given, with one exception. The obverse of the Brown Fiber 50 is a new variety, so it is described in full as Brown Fiber Type 1A(2). *An aluminum token of this type may exist.*

This list describes the red, blue, gray, brown and green fiber pieces in my collection. Fiber tokens may have weak or missing letters and outlines as found on some metal Red Goose Premium Money. We also find weak or missing denticles on one or both sides of fiber pieces. We do not list these minor errors, but we do need complete descriptions and photocopies of the obverses and reverses of all fiber token denominations or varieties that are not in the following list.

The Red Fiber Pieces

Red fiber tokens are found in many shades from light red to maroon. All of these pieces will be called "red fiber" in this list, however, some collectors also are saving a second set of the darker pieces. Maroon 50 and 1⁰⁰ tokens are listed in the catalogue, Play Money of American Children by Richard F. Clothier.

The red fiber 50 and 1⁰⁰ pieces were found more frequently than smaller red fiber denominations or other colored fiber pieces, but small groups of several colored pieces were noticed through the years...before I started saving the Red Goose varieties. It is not possible to establish a rarity rating for Red Goose money from the small sampling that we have studied.

Approximate measures for the diameters of fiber pieces are as follows: 5⁰⁰ (25mm); 1⁰⁰ (28mm); 50 (25mm); 25 (22,5mm); 10 (16mm); 5 (20mm). No red fiber 5⁰⁰ piece is presently known.

- Blue Fiber 5⁰⁰ -Obverse and Reverse same as Bronze 5⁰⁰, Type 1A(1)
- Blue Fiber 1⁰⁰ -Obverse and Reverse same as Aluminum 1⁰⁰, Type 1A(3), except a 28mm diameter
- Blue Fiber 50 -Obverse and Reverse same as Aluminum 50, Type 1A(1)
- Blue Fiber 25 -Obverse and Reverse same as Aluminum 25, Type 1A(1)
- Blue Fiber 10 -Obverse and Reverse same as Aluminum 10, Type 1A(1)

The Brown Fiber Pieces

The tokens inspected for inclusion in this list of brown fiber pieces varied in color from dark brown to a lighter brown with a slightly reddish tint. All appeared to be brown when placed next to a red fiber piece, so four denominations are presently listed. Only the brown fiber 25 is listed in the catalogue, Play Money For American Children, by Richard Clothier.

Brown Fiber 50 -Obverse: small 50, squared lettering, different from Aluminum 50, Type 1A(1) with 50 positioned slightly further to the left; 0 in 50 almost 3mm from EY of MONEY; 5 closer to RE of PREMIUM; 5 further from 0 in 50; round curve at upper left edge of 5 instead of an extended line segment, Type 1A(2)

-Reverse: same as reverse of Aluminum 50, Type 1A(1)

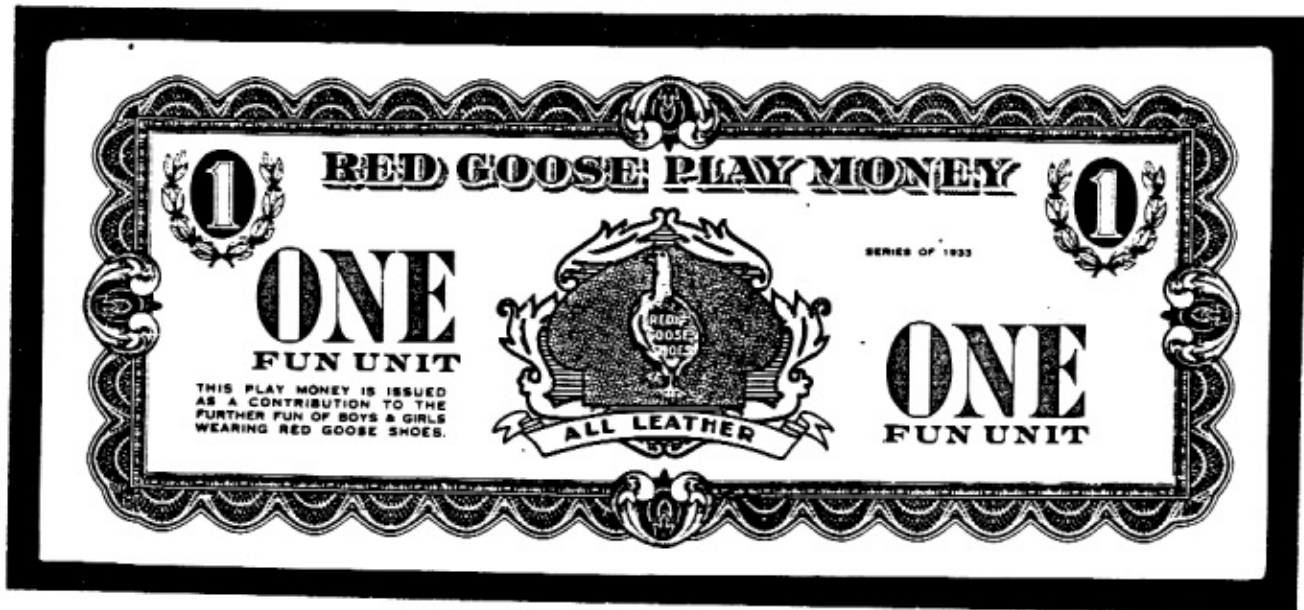

We were able to improve some photocopies by using tokens in uncirculated or almost uncirculated condition. And in some cases, I was able to see more than one example of a token, making it possible to write better descriptions for the supplement of new varieties which will be published later. We believe there are many unlisted varieties of bronze or fiber 5⁰⁰ and aluminum or fiber 1⁰⁰, 50, 25, 10 and 5 pieces of Red Goose Premium Money. Also, there are two Presidential / Red Goose pieces which we have not seen...the 23rd President, Benjamin Harrison and 32nd President, Franklin D. Roosevelt. At least one variety of each of the other thirty presidential pieces has been pictured. 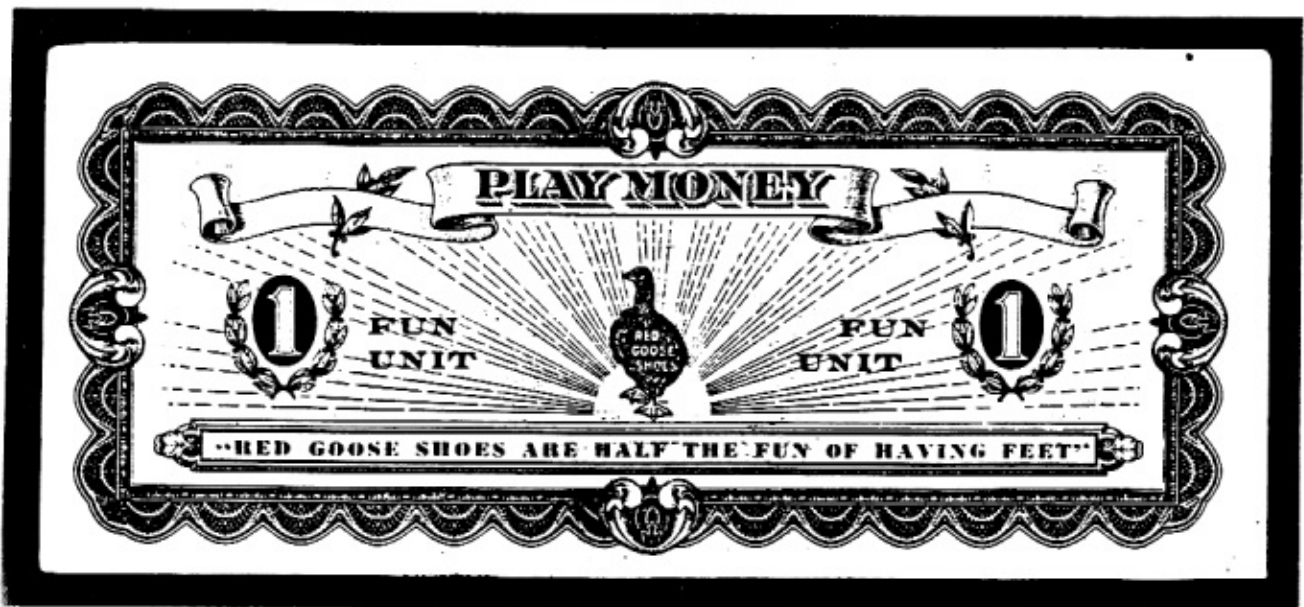
RED GOOSE PLAY MONEY®

A colorful set of Red Goose Play Money, dated 1933, has a decorative border on both sides and shows workmanship of a higher quality than we generally see for modern sets. Bills are presently known in 1, 5, 10, 20 and 100 Fun Units.

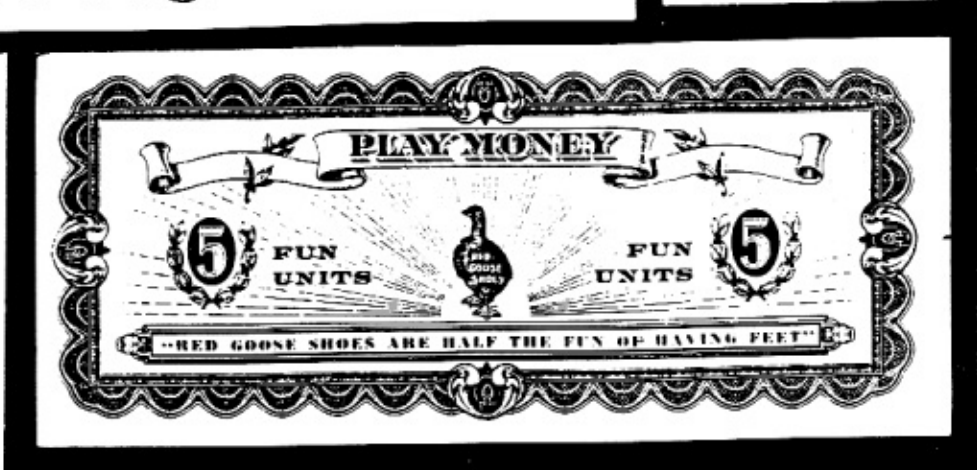


The attractive One Fun Unit obverse, pictured above in actual size, has a dark green border and dark green print, except the goose at the center which is red.



The reverse has a dark green border with interior print in both green and red. The expression, "RED GOOSE SHOES ARE HALF THE FUN OF HAVING FEET," is printed in red. Also, the goose and rays extending toward the border from the goose are red. Everything else is printed in dark green ink.

Pictures of the 5, 10 and 20 Fun Units bills are reduced to 75% of actual size.
The bills are printed on white paper and measure 162 by 70 millimeters.

There is a big contrast in the color of bills in this set. All bills have "RED GOOSE SHOES ARE HALF THE FUN OF HAVING FEET," printed in red and a red goose on both sides with red rays extending from the goose on the reverse of each bill. The borders and other printing are as follows: 5 FUN UNITS (Brown); 10 FUN UNITS (Purple); 20 FUN UNITS (Slate or dark gray); 100 FUN UNITS (Orange).

These are the only Red Goose Play Money denominations presently known, but there may be a 50 FUN UNITS bill, or others, which I have not seen. If you have any different Red Goose bills in your collection, please send a good photocopy of each side at actual size to help complete the catalogue.

EXPOSING A LIBERTY HEAD NON-PLAY COIN

(Things are not always as they seem or you wish they were)

While browsing at a flea market near Hampton, Georgia recently, the above piece, shining brightly in the noon-day sun, caught my eye. My first thought was this surely must be the ultimate whopper-size play coin ever made or certainly rank a close second! After a closer examining, boy, was I surprised when I turned the item over to find it was made for something unrelated to play money—would you believe a personal RADIO! The radio comes equipped with a neck lanyard and plug-in for a set of ear speakers.

The obverse has a Liberty head facing left and inscription "E GOTHAMUS UNUM" in raised letters. Several incuse grooves resembling an "A" turned sideways appear as a counterstamp of sorts. Several strange & unfamiliar hieroglyphics-type markings appear randomly imbedded around the obverse design. (These symbols might be related to Batman or have meaning that is known to readers of DC Comics.)

The reverse is marked "©1995 MICRO GAMES / OF AMERICA / ALL RIGHTS RESERVED / NORTH HILLS, CA 91343 / MADE IN CHINA / ©1995 DC COMICS" (all in small raised letters in six lines).

A physical description follows: Round, Obverse chrome-plated plastic, 74.0 mm in diameter. Edge is 9.8 mm thick. The reverse is made of black plastic. A small silver-color decal affixed to the edge reads "MADE IN CHINA / ©1995 DC Comics" (black lettering in two lines). I'm at a loss in explaining how the radio may be distributed, sold or what one may cost. Maybe other unusual or similar items that resemble a play coin are out there, waiting to be discovered and exposed as a non-play coin.
