More "freebies" are included with this issue thanks to Jane Sears and E.B. Scott. Plus, there is a little surprise thrown in as usual.

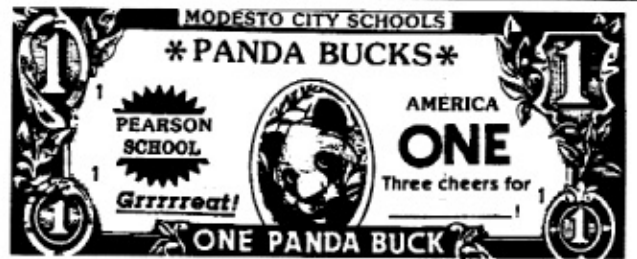
As I mentioned, this is an expanded issue due to the length of our in-depth articles. It raises our

Note that we have four new members listed this time! We're glad they joined us and hope they enjoy the organization as much as many of the rest of us have.

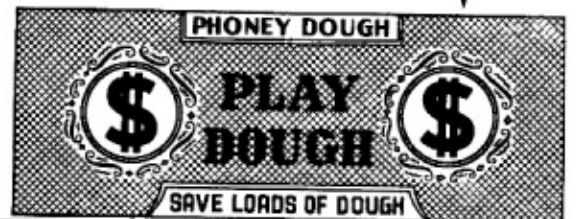

PIRATE'S ISLAND

A Game of Adventure

A colorful picture of four pirates using a pulley and rope to lift a treasure chest from a hole drew my attention to a large game box under a table at a recent antique show. Pirate's Island is a game for 2, 3 or 4 players which features four treasures: Long John's treasure; Capt. Kidd's treasure; Blackbeard's treasure; Pegleg's treasure. Sixty pieces of eight were provided with the game, fifteen for each player.



Six Different Pieces of Eight

The game originally had ten of each of the six different pieces of eight pictured above, but a few were missing when I bought the game, so I was able to make only eight, six-piece sets. The gold colored cardboard pieces have the same picture on both sides. They have a 25mm diameter, black print and a 4mm center hole. The center hole is used to stack the pieces of eight on a small stick with a round, thick wooden base placed at each of the four treasure sites on Pirate's Island. The object of the board game is to avoid as many perils as possible and make it back to Pirate's Haven on the mainland with more treasure (pieces of eight) than any other player.

The Pirate's Island game has a copyright date, 1942, by the Quality Paper Box Co., Corey Game Division, Boston, Mass. It was designed by Nathan Reinherz and made in the U. S. A.

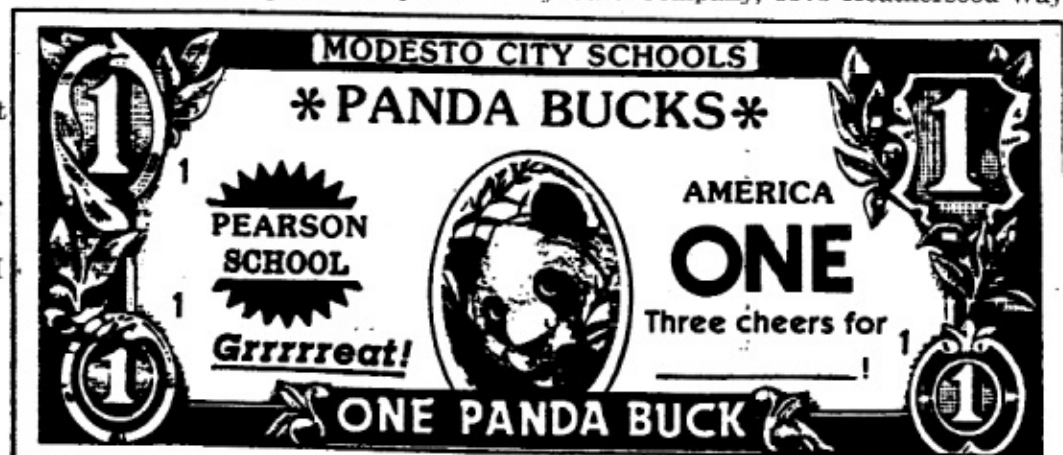
The following article was submitted by member John Dalton and I also saw it in *Coin World*:

THIMBLE THEATRE — POPEYE

In my last article I introduced you to Lucky Bucks. In this article we will look at **THIMBLE THEATRE** created by E.C.Segar (1894-1983), a King Feature Syndicate. This comic strip which featured the Oyl family began on December 19, 1919. The daily strip ended in August 1937, and the Sunday page ended in October 1937.

LIST OF CHARACTERS:

- OLIVE OYL**- a tall and lean spinster
CASTOR OYL- a very short enterprising hustler
COLE OYL- father
NANA OYL- mother
HAM GRAVY- Olive's first boyfriend
POPEYE- He first appeared on January 17, 1929, as a hired hand on Castor's boat. The love of Olive's life. He was known for his spinach chomping and strength.
J. WELLINGTON WIMPY (Wimpy) On March 3, 1931, Wimpy made his debut as a moocher who loved to eat hamburgers.
BILL BARNACLE-the owner of the Roughhouse cafe
HAGAN- a virtually indestructible man with pop-eyed features

There may be other characters, but the ones above appear mostly in the 32-33 Lucky Buck period. The bill's are at 65% of the original size.

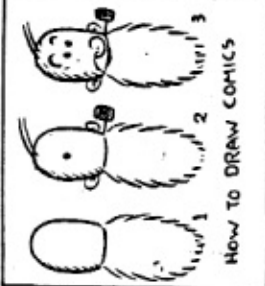

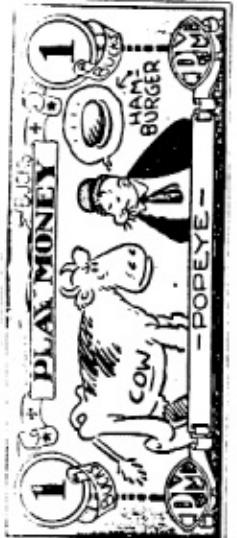
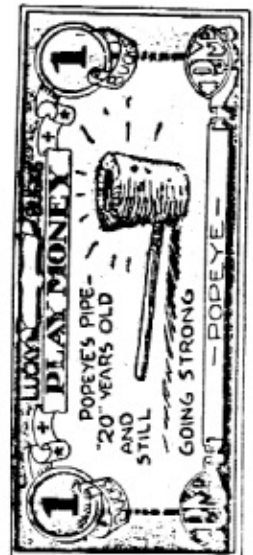

THE RED GOOSE SHOES PRESIDENTIAL SERIES©

This series of aluminum tokens with busts of our first thirty-two presidents was introduced during the 1930's. Each token has a 25 millimeter diameter and a plain edge. Close examination of the pictures and lettering on approximately two hundred fifty tokens suggests that only one obverse die was used for each president, but due to the small number checked, obverse varieties may exist. We found that the manufacturer matched each obverse die with one or more of seven known minor reverse varieties.



A typical token shows President Wilson on the obverse and a Red Goose Shoes reverse.

Reverse inscriptions for tokens in this series are the same with RED GOOSE SHOES (in three lines across the front of a large goose) at the center. Each reads, FOR BOYS (in two lines at the left) and FOR GIRLS (in two lines at the right) with HALF THE FUN OF HAVING FEET (in an arc) at the bottom. There is a star before HALF and a star after FEET. The manufacturer's name and location, OSBORNE CO. CINTI., are on tokens of this series in very small letters under FUN OF HAVING. You may recall that many of the bronze 5⁰⁰ and aluminum Red Goose Premium tokens have the manufacturer's name and abbreviations for the city and state, usually "CIN. O." on the reverse.

Several minor differences are found on the seven reverse varieties in this series. Enlarged pictures of these begin on the next page at 225% of actual size. We use the position of letters in "OSBORNE CO. CINTI." in relation to the letters in "FUN OF HAVING" to help identify each reverse. While some collectors will save only one token for each president in the series, others will be interested in saving the varieties, so several check points are listed under the picture for each type of reverse.

Reverse Varieties of the Red Goose Shoes Presidential Series



Reverse A

- S of OSBORNE under U in FUN
- O of OF over right side of E in OSBORNE
- O of CO. directly under upright of F in OF
- Left side of A in HAVING points to second I in CINTI. (Similar to Reverse D)



Reverse B

- R of OSBORNE under center of N in FUN
- O in OF over space at right of E in OSBORNE
- O of CO. under upright of F in OF
- IN of CINTI. under upright segments in H of HAVING (Similar to Reverse G)
- Left side of A in HAVING points to T in CINTI.



Reverse C

- SB of OSBORNE under U of FUN
- RN of OSBORNE under N of FUN
- C of CO. under O in OF
- TI of CINTI. under H of HAVING
- Leg of goose formed by two lines with oval dots between the lines



Reverse D

- S of OSBORNE centered under U in FUN
- OR of OSBORNE directly under N of FUN
- Upright of F in OF at right side of O in CO
- O in OF over space at right of E in OSBORNE
- O in OF over space between E of OSBORNE and C of CO.
- Left side of A in HAVING points to second I in CINTI. (Similar to Reverse A)
- NT of CINTI. under H of HAVING

Reverse E

- *Triangular dot before H of HALF*
- O of OSBORNE under right side of F in FUN
- Upright of F in OF points between O and period after CO.
- N of CINTI. under center of H in HAVING
- Left side of A in HAVING points between T and I of CINTI.



Reverse F

- N in FUN over second O and left side of R in OSBORNE
- O in OF over right side of E in OSBORNE
- IN of CINTI. under upright segments of H in HAVING
- Left side of A in HAVING points to right side of T in CINTI.



Reverse G

- *OR of OSBORNE under upright segments of N in FUN*
- *IN of CINTI. under upright segments of H in HAVING*
- O of CO. under F in OF
- Left side of A in HAVING points to T of CINTI. (Similar to Reverse B)

COLLECT VARIETIES?

If you collect minor reverse varieties, the following hints may simplify the work required to correctly identify a reverse. For example, to tell the difference between Reverse B and Reverse G, check under the letter N in FUN and under H in HAVING. Reverse G has OR directly under the upright segments of N and IN directly under the upright segments of H. When you check both varieties you will see the difference.

It will help to remember the check points written in italic type. For Reverses C and E, the type of legs and the triangular dot, respectively, will suggest the variety. A 10-power magnifying glass will help.

Obverses in the Red Goose Shoes Presidential Series

The tokens in this series have a presidential bust at the center of the obverse with the beginning year and ending year above the head for his years in office. No engraver's name or manufacturer's name appears on the obverse, although all tokens have "OSBORNE CO. CINTI." in small letters on each reverse to denote the manufacturer, The Osborne Register Co., Cincinnati, Ohio.

Pictures of token obverses for thirty-two presidents are shown at 150% of actual size. Each line of the obverse inscription is printed under a picture of the obverse with one additional line giving the known type(s) of reverse matched with the obverse.



These enlarged pictures show the 32nd President and Reverse E.

The Presidential Red Goose set was issued while Franklin D. Roosevelt was president, so only 1933, the year of his inauguration, appears above his forehead. In the picture at the right, there is a small, triangular mark resembling a dot before the H of HALF on the Reverse E. This is a convenient way to quickly recognize the variety.

Descriptions of tokens in the series consist of the presidential number followed by a letter for the type of reverse. For example, the typical Red Goose Shoes Presidential token, above, shows President Franklin D. Roosevelt, the 32nd U. S. President, matched with Reverse E. We describe this token as: President / Red Goose 32E.

Our series of Presidential Red Goose Tokens appears to be complete, except for other possible minor reverse varieties. We welcome any additional information about this series, Red Goose Premium Money and Red Goose Play Money.

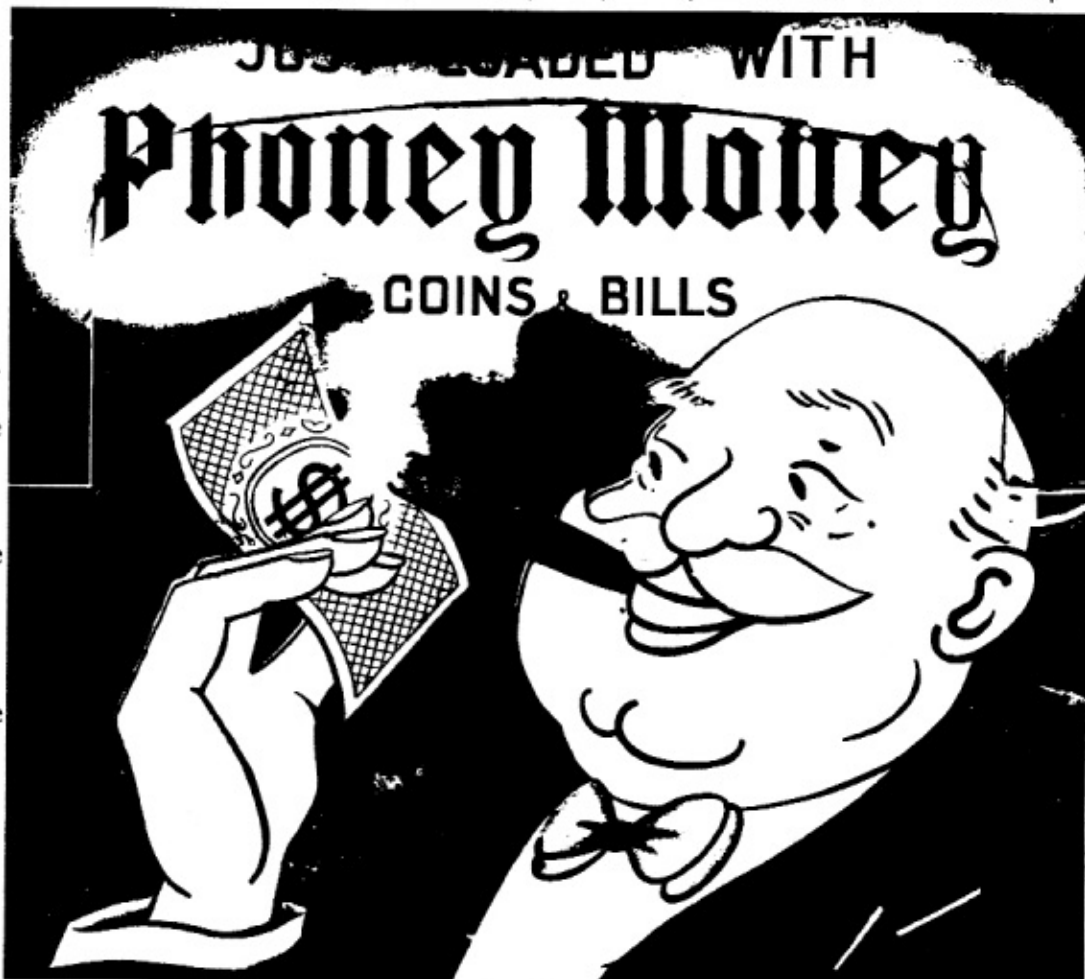

PHONEY MONEY

On a recent trip to Nashville, TN, Barbara and I visited several antique malls as we do on all of our trips. We had found a few items when I spotted this original box of play money that was intended for dealers. The box top, shown below, is in red, blue, black, and white. It also has a flap that could be

folded up to act as a sign and display the contents. The front and back sides of the box say "Be loaded, phoney dough, bills and coins, you can have money to burn". One side of the box pictures the currency while the opposite side shows coins. Inside are three dozen packages of currency, but no coins, despite what the box shows. Each package contains 30 bills, like the one shown, in five denominations; \$1, \$5, \$10,



\$100, and \$1,000. Both the box and each bill are marked "Made in Japan". The bill's obverses are black printing on a white background while the reverses are green on white.

But the question remains, did they really make any coins at all to go with this set? And, if so, why weren't they packaged with the currency. I have shown one of the



coins that was pictured to see if anyone can identify it. If so, we now know the origin of this type of coin.
