The "freebies" this time come from Elmore Scott and Millard Hajek (they go along with his article); thanks guys.



HUNT VALLEY MALL BEAR BUCKS


The Hunt Valley Mall featured "Bear Bucks" this past holiday season (1997) as a promotion to stimulate retail shopping at the mall. Located North of Baltimore City, just East of I-83 at Shawan and York Roads in Cockeysville, Maryland, the Hunt Valley Mall offered a "Bear Buck" for every \$10 in purchases from November 28th through January 24th. The Bear Bucks were then used for bidding on a variety of items in the Bear Buck Auction that took place on Family Bear Day, January 24th, 1998. In addition, shoppers with receipts ranging from \$50 to \$125 could receive gifts at the mall's Concierge.

The 1997-1998 "Bear Bucks", with the 5 denomination illustrated below, are 2 5/8" X 6 1/4" in size, and came in three denominations; \$1 - purple color, \$5 - yellow color and \$10 - hot pink color. the Bear Buck value expired on February 15, 1998. Featured on the Bear Bucks were the Family Bears singing Beartones, a computerized quartet who entertained the holiday shoppers with Christmas songs.

The Bear Buck promotion was initiated for the holiday season in 1996 and as a result of being quite successful, it was used again in 1997. Winter "Bear Bucks" used for the 1996-1997 holiday season were 2 9/16" X 6 1/8" in size with the "Jackson Bear" for its central design. They were issued in four denominations; \$1 - green color, \$5 - blue color, \$10 - reddish orange color and \$20 - yellow color with the 20 denomination illustrated below.

The Yellow Kid To Henry To Lucky Bucks

On Sunday May 5,1895 Richard Felton Outcault introduced the first comic character. The Yellow Kid was born. The New York World ran a two panel strip. One was a color strip called "At The Circus in Hogan's Alley". The other panel was black and white. A new era in newspaper entertainment had begun. This ragamuffin, oriental, slum kid had captured the hearts of the public. The success of the Yellow Kid inspired other artists to create other characters, and the Sunday comic pages became a household necessity.

As the times changed so did the comics. World War I, the Flapper era, and the Great Depression all had an influence on the exploits of the comic characters. On March 19,1932, Carl Anderson introduced another boy character called Henry. Henry like the Yellow Kid captured the hearts of the public. However, Henry did not become a fullfledged strip until December 17,1934, when it became a daily strip and on March 10,1935, it made the Sunday Section. This character became so popular that Herbert Tareyton issued a set of 79 cards to be given away, one at a time, in his cigarette packs. Shortly after, a British Company issued 7 different sets, also given away in cigarette packs. The Sunday, September 8, 1935, full page of Henry has, at the bottom, three pieces of Lucky Bucks.

The Great Depression caused many hardships, and many families had to make sacrifices. Toys were one of those items that, in many cases, were done away with. The newspapers saw a great opportunity to broaden their field and, at the same time, do a public service. The introduction of paper cutout dolls, Thimble Theatre (Popeye), Play store (coins and products to sell), Seeing Star Stamps, and Lucky Bucks all became the toys of many children of the time. These paper items were collected, played with, traded, and stored away.

World War II came along and collections were stored in closets and forgotten by everyone but Mom. Those great treasure were only piles of junk to Mom, and off the junk went to the garbage

dump.

When the war was over and Johnny came marching home the treasures were not cried over. The collecting desire took over and the desire to replace them was stronger than ever. Stories would always be told of the great fortunes thrown away by Mom.

Over the years I was able to replace the Yellow Kid and Henry items that were lost. Being a Non-Sport card collector the hunt was always the important thing. Every once in a while a small pile of Lucky Bucks would turn up. Since I never saw any ad from collectors looking for these, it was assumed that the only one interested in these was me. In June of 1997 I finally found an ad, and I got to know Jack Phillips. The rest is history. The Lucky Bucks came out of the closet, and a new collecting experience had begun.

It was important to know who these characters were and what strip they came from. As a kid the knowledge was there, but was not carried into adulthood. Jane Sears and Jack were very helpful and with the help of three great sources it was possible to identify the characters that follow. The list is not complete. If you have a Lucky Buck with a character not listed please send me a photocopy and I will add the name to the list. Next year the list will be updated and a copy sent to those who have contributed.

<u>Dumb Dora by Chic Young</u> (Note:Young left strip to do Blondie, Paul Fung took over.) Dora, Rodney: Dora's boyfriend (until 1932), Bing Brown; New Boyfriend

Elmer by A.C.Fera (Note: Originally called Just Boy, Charles Winner took over in 1925 & changed strip to Elmer.) Elmer Tuttle, Clem Tuttle, Ella Tuttle, Officer Nolan, Black Marn, Spot: A dog, Jane

Felix The Cat by Pat Sullivan Felix, Phyllis: love of his life, Laura: A Parrot, Dud: A dog

Happy Holligan by Fred Opper Happy Hooligan, Gloomy Gus: His brother, Montmcrency: Another brother, Mr Dubb (Leaves strip in 1921), Flip: Mongrel Dog, Si Mirandi (enters 1921), Maud The Mule (enters 1921), Alphonso & Gaston: has an adventure with Happy

It's Papa Who Pays by James Edward Murphy Mama, Papa, (they have 4 children, Note: Murphy introduced character stamps in 1934.)

<u>Just Kids by Ad Carter</u> Mush Stebbins, Fatso Dolan, Pat Chan, Officer Bluenose: Truant Officer, Mr. Branner: A Cop (Note: They live in Barnsville), Pat Finnegan, Bagears.

<u>Katzenjammer Kids by Rudolph Dirks</u> (Note: The name of strip was changed several times), Mama, Papa: Der Captain, Hans, Fritz, Der Inspector (Note: When Harold Kerr took over he introduced Lena, Miss Twiddle, Rollo.)

The Kid Sister by Lyman Young (Note: Kid Sister is an off-shoot of Kelly Kids. It was a top strip to Tim Tyler's Luck.) Geo.Wilners, Count Totalos, Horatio Chaddleberry, Trixie, Auntie Lottie, Jane.

Little Jimmy by James Swinnerton Jimmy Thompson, pinkie: Baseball Player, Buck: Pinkie's Bulldog, Beans: Jimmy's Dog, Lil Ole Bear, Poncho: Fighting Rooster, Somolo: Indian Brave, Mr Batch: Shipwrecked with Jimmy. (Note: Swinnerton did a color page in Good HouseKeeping called Canyon Kiddies. There is a Lucky Buck "Canyon Kid and Rabbit".)

Mickey Mouse Created by Walt Disney.
Floyd Gottfredson drew strip for over 20 years.
Mickey Mouse, Minnie Mouse, Pluto, Horace,
Clarabelle, Mortimer Fieldmouse.

Mr.Jack by James Swinerton (Note: "Little Jimmy" was a top strip to Mr.Jack from Feb.7, 1926 until June 5, 1935.) Mr.Jack.

<u>Parlor, Bedroom, & Sink by Billy De Beck</u> (Note: It was created as a top strip to "Barney Google".)

THE POPEYE PLAY STORE WAS A UNIQUE ENTERPRISING ADVENTURE FOR CHILDREN. IT APPEARED WEEKLY IN THE SUNDAY COMIC SECTION OF THE EARLY 1940'S NEWSPAPERS. EACH COMIC PANEL WAS IN FULL COLOR AND MEASURED 6 1/2" LONG X 3 1/2" WIDE. THE CHARACTER OF POPEYE APPEARED ON EACH PANEL, EXPLAINING TO CHILDREN ABOUT THE PRODUCT THAT WAS BEING SHOWN. A FAR OUT PRODUCT WAS ILLUSTRATED SOMEWHERE WITHIN THE PANEL. CHILDREN WERE INSTRUCTED TO PASTE THE LABEL ON AN EMPTY BOTTLE, JAR OR BOX. PRICES WERE TO BE WRITTEN ON THE LABEL IF NECESSARY OR TO USE THE SUPPLIED TAG TO ATTACH IT TO THE PRODUCT.

COMIC PAPER COINS WERE ON EACH PANEL. MOST PANELS
CONTAINED 2 OR MORE COINS, SOMETIMES AS MANY AS FIVE. THE
CARTOON CHARACTERS APPEARING ON THE COINS WERE POPEYE, OLIVE
OYL, SWEETPEA, WIMPY, JEEP, PROFESSOR WOTASNOZZLE, ALICE THE
GOON, AND MANY OTHERS. THE CHARACTERS AND AMOUNTS CHANGED
FROM WEEK TO WEEK. THE DENOMINATIONS WERE 1 PENNY, 5 CENTS,
1 DIME, TEN CENTS, (YES, THIS IS CORRECT), TWENTY-FIVE CENTS,
FIFTY CENTS, ONE DOLLAR, AND 5 DOLLARS. THE CHILDREN WERE

GETTING A SPELLING LESSON AND THEY DIDN'T EVEN KNOW IT. THE VALUES WERE SPELLED OUT ON THE COINS. KIDS WERE ENCOURAGED TO PASTE THE COINS ON CARDBOARD AND CUT THEM OUT. COLLECT ENOUGH TO USE IN THEIR CASH BOX. THEY NEEDED ENOUGH TO MAKE CHANGE ACCORDING TO POPEYE.

ONE PANEL DATED JANUARY 1, 1942 ISSUED A POPEYE MERCHANT LICENSE. CERTIFYING THAT SAID PERSON WAS AN OFFICIAL POPEYE MERCHANT AUTHORIZED TO SELL POPEYE PRODUCTS. THIS ALSO WAS BE TO PASTED UP ON CARDBOARD AND DISPLAYED IN THEIR STORE.
